VERMONT LIONS CHARITIES CABINET MEETING REPORT – SUNDAY AUGUST 30, 2020 EAGLES CLUB – MANCHETER

Good afternoon everyone,

My report today will be quite brief due to COVID – 19. One would think that during this time, VLC would be swamped with requests. However, since March, I can only recall three requests:

- 1. Funds vis the Central Vt. Hospice for PPE equipment request failed due to not having sufficient information
- 2. Vermont Food Bank donation of \$5,000...recommendation via Board member
- 3. And most recently, request for hearing aids(s) assistance, amount of \$3,000. This request was discussed this morning and action taken.

Relating pediatric cancer and our commitment of \$500 stipends to Vermont families dealing with pediatric cancer. Our 18th stipend was recently provided to a family of a 5 year old girl who was admitted to the UVM's Children's Hospital and was diagnosed with acute myeloid leukemia (AML). The 5 year old will also require a bone marrow transplant at the Boston's Children's Hospital..... here is a comment made by Julia Conner, Pediatric Hematology and Oncology Social worker and I quote:

"We are so thankful that your organization has kindly made these funds available to our patients and families. The financial assistance provided through the Vermont Lions helps families pay their bills, cover childcare costs and manage lost wages while they care for their sick child. We are deeply grateful for your support of children and families battling pediatric cancer" (end of quote).

In closing, I must provide the following information: The annual meeting of Vermont Lions Charities will be held during the Fall Conference on Saturday, November 1, 2020. A full report on Vermont Lions Charities will be provide at that time. There also will be an election for the position of treasurer; a 3-year term.



Hello Colchester Lions:

Some of you may not know that the club has decided to generously support my daughter Amy Stearns with her need to get a service dog in training. Amy is a past member of the Colchester Club and needs a dog to help her with physical, emotional support as well as independent living.

Amy got Robby on June 28, and they are both very happy and living in her apartment in Burlington. Robby was 7 months old when he came home. He has grown some and seems to be a very happy boy.

Robby has had an assessment with the service dog trainer and passed the tests. He was given very high praise for how well he did. She believes that Robby is a good candidate for a service dog. He will begin his official dog training on August 13.

Amy has trained another service dog who is getting old and is now deaf and going blind. She has been retired and is living with a group of Amy' s friends. Amy gets to visit her several times a week. With Amy' s past experience she has started training Robby since she got him. He knew sit, stay and come commands. He now knows sit stay, leave it, bring me home (he will lead Amy to the front door of her apartment) he is working on touch command where he will touch the button medical alert button to alert that she need emergency services. Amy reported that he has gotten pretty good at this and has pushed the button several times to get the people who monitor her system to talk with him. The people doing the monitoring thought this was great. They gave Robby a lot of attention. Amy is now teaching him that he can do this only on command. She reports that Robby is learning and has not pushed the button without being given the command to do so for several days.

New Lions **Club Forms In Randolph** Area

A committee of members from the Heartland Lions Club, which serves South which serves Royalton, Tunbridge, and Sharon, has worked for a number of months to form the new Braintree, Brookfield, & Randolph Area Lions Club.

"We'll be known as the BBR Club in the future, because that's a mouthful," joked Walter Hastings of South Royalton. He is joined on the com-mittee by Carole Greene, also Mood, along with Michael McShane of Braintree, and Ken Emery, the immediate past District Governor of Vermont Lions Clubs, who has traveled from Colchester to

attend committee meetings. Both longtime Lions Club members, Hastings has served as District Governor for District 45 (Vermont); and Greene has served as secre-tary of the Hartland Lions Club, is currently the First Vice District Governor for Vermont, and next year, will be the District Governor for the state of Vermont.

was because the Heartland club had been giving out a lot of hearing aids and glasses in the BBR area and that's one of the functions of Lions Club International, along with programs about diabetes, childhood cancer, hunger, and the environment," Hastings added. "Also, our motto is that 'we serve.'"

"We have one member from Braintree who could see this need that wasn't being filled, Greene explained, "so that's one of the reasons we're start-

ing the club. "We're planning our first service. project for Friday, Aug. 28 at the Randolph Rec Field, when we'll meet with staff and clients of Upper Valley Services for an ice cream social," she noted.

"We also plan to hand out hand sanitizer and face masks at the Randolph Farmers Market next to Gifford Hospital on Saturdays in September," Hastings added. "And in October, we'll do a food drive to benefit area food shelves.

"Back in March, we went to the town meetings in all three towns to find out who might be interested on joining," Hastings recalled. "We got a list of about 30 people, but then the pandemic arrived, so the meeting we had sched wled for the end of March didn't happen."

In May, the committee held a successful virtual meeting with four interested people via Zoom, and in June, met in person with eight people, plus the committee, outside at the Morgan Orchards in Randolph Center. They then decided to meet again later that month at the Rotary Park in Randolph, to continue organizing the new club.

Hastings and Greene said they hope to have 12 peo-ple attending from the three towns, "and we'd like to form a whole club, for which you need 20 members, but with the five very interested members that we have now, we can form a branch club, which this will be until we can grow the membership. "One reason we wanted to

form a club in the BBR area

"Another thing that we do locally is vision screenings," Hastings said. "We have a vision screener that we can bring to area schools to screen a child's vision to see if they need glasses. Last year, the clubs in the state screened a quarter of all the kids in Vermont, but due to the pandemic, that's one of the things that's on hold right now. We are hoping to do some screening in public spots and we can

screen adults, too." Helping is not limited to those particular areas, Hastings noted, saying, "Any need there is in the commu-"Any nity, we'll try to help. We say where there is a need, there is a Lion."

The next general membership meeting of the new Lions Club will be Tuesday, Aug. 26 at 6 p.m. at the pavilion at Rotary Park in Randolph. New people who would like to learn how to help serve their community are welcome to attend. Masks and social distancing are requested.



Preston closed the ceremony with words of gratitude and spoke about "the wonderful place that is Strafford." She said she was honored to be able to give back for all that she has received.




Londonderry Tri-Mountain Area Lions

The following is information received from ID Mark Lyon with information from Lions Club International:

Dear Lion Mark,

Thank you for inquiring about the 2020-2021 Lions International Peace Poster Contest. The theme for this year is "Peace Through Service."

The coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic has presented us with new challenges. As such, we Lions have learned new ways to engage with one another and our communities by navigating Zoom meetings, e-learning, working from home and much more. We believe that these same practices can also be applied to sponsoring the Peace Poster Contest.

A Lions Blog titled "Six Tips for Organizing a Peace Poster Contest During COVID-19" will be posted soon. I am including those six tips at the bottom of this email for your reference.

We are moving forward with the Peace Poster Contest rules and deadlines as they appear in the Peace Poster Kit. Though kits have already been for sale for several months, the first contest deadline isn't until November 15 (Postmark deadline for a club to send one winning poster per contest sponsored to the district governor). Be sure to purchase your Peace Poster kits online before October 1.

As a reminder, participating children are allowed to create their posters in their homes. The contest still needs to be hosted by a school or organized youth group but the participating children do not need to create the posters while they are physically in a school classroom or youth group facility.

Also, posters may be created digitally. However, those posters must follow all the same rules and guidelines as traditionally created posters. This means that your club's winning poster must still be the individual student's original creation and it must be printed (following the same size guidelines and rules as all other Peace Posters) before sending it on to the next level of judging with the completed Winner Sticker (PPC-4) stuck on the back of it.

Please let us know if you have any further questions about the contest and thank you again for sponsoring and supporting this program of peace at a time when the world needs positive programs like this more than ever.

We would love to hear how you are adapting and innovating the way you hold your contest. Post your photos and stories on social media using the hashtag #PeacePoster and email them to us at peaceposter@lionsclubs.org.

Six Tips for Organizing a Peace Poster Contest During COVID-19

• Email or call your school or youth group leaders to check in, confirm their participation in this year's contest and offer your support.

• Encourage schools conducting e-learning to participate by providing contest rules and instructions online. Students can then complete their posters at home and drop them off to the designated school contact.

• Provide your name, email address and phone number to the participating school or youth group contact and make plans to collect the posters from them for the local judging.

• Follow local guidelines for gathering and practicing social distancing when holding your contest judging (at the club, district and multiple district levels).

Consider holding your contest judging online. Photograph the entries and post them without the student's names (remember it is a blind judging) in an online photo gallery such as Flickr, Google Photos, etc. Share the link with your judges and include a score sheet to email back to you.
Recognize local winners by sharing their poster images with your local news media and by posting them on social media (Facebook, Instagram Twitter, etc.) with #PeacePoster.



North America Membership Initiative



Frequently Asked Questions

Overview

1) What is the North America Membership Initiative (NAMI)?

NAMI is a focused program designed to address and reverse the decline in Lions membership in Constitutional Areas 1 and 2 (CA1 and CA2).

2) Who authorized NAMI?

The Lions Clubs International Board of Directors authorized NAMI at the October 2018 board meeting.

3) Why is this program important?

Evidence of similar membership declines is appearing in other parts of the world. We need to establish a solid plan for revitalization and growth before our organization's ability to serve humanity—our core mission—is fundamentally compromised.

4) What are the NAMI objectives?

1) Rejuvenate districts with new clubs, 2) Revitalize clubs with new members, and 3) Remotivate members with new fellowships and exciting service.

5) What is the NAMI plan?

In 2019-20, nine NAMI pilot districts tested the NAMI processes and resources. They also developed their own innovations to achieve membership goals. For 2020-21, all North America districts have been invited to join the evolving program and help develop and test best practices. We will also further develop NAMI for regions/zones and clubs.

6) What are the goals of NAMI?

By June 2021, we expect 200 new clubs and 44,000 new members in CA1, and 20 new clubs and 5,000 new members in CA2. The goals for June 2023 are 315,000 total members in CA1 and 38,000 total members in CA2.

7) Who is leading the initiative?

The initiative is being led by International Vice Presidents Doug Alexander, Brian Sheehan and Patti Hill, alongside a Steering Committee of Lion leaders with proven skills in club and membership growth.

8) How is NAMI funded?

NAMI is being funded with existing operational budgets.

9) Where can I find more information about the NAMI process, resources and results? All NAMI information is published online at lionsclubs.org/nami.



Participation

10) How are NAMI pilot districts selected?

The Steering Committee selects pilot districts based on membership trends, key demographics and leadership team commitment to be the vanguard of this vital initiative.

11) What languages are NAMI materials available in?

Because NAMI is still evolving, all NAMI communications and materials are currently in English. We are still learning what works and incorporating what we learn into our process and resources. We understand, however, that enterprising Lions are already translating key materials into additional languages.

12) What happens after a district decides to participate?

Leaders from each district meet to build a team, develop their own goals and a plan for achieving them.

13) Who leads the initiative in NAMI districts?

Part of building a NAMI team is identifying a NAMI Champion, a district leader promotes and manages the initiative, fosters execution and reports results. The Champion works side-by-side with the district governor team, GAT coordinators, region/zone chairpersons, and other district leaders on plan development, implementation and accountability.

14) What are the roles and responsibilities of council chairpersons with NAMI districts?

Council chairpersons review the NAMI goals and plans of their districts and demonstrate their support of the initiative and its leaders. They should allocate time at each of their council meetings for NAMI progress updates, next steps, idea sharing and issue resolution.

15) What are the roles and responsibilities of district governor teams in NAMI districts?

District governor teams are directly involved in planning, promoting and supporting NAMI activities throughout their districts. Individual roles are identified during the team building process within each district.

16) How is the Global Action Team (GAT) involved?

The GAT volunteer structure serves as the primary communication and support channel for NAMI processes and resources. For example, GAT Area leaders will provide webinars to share NAMI processes and resources with GAT MD leaders, DG teams and district GAT coordinators. GAT MD leaders will also review NAMI district goals and plans, so they can assist districts with implementation and accountability.

17) How are clubs of NAMI districts involved?

Clubs are the foundation of NAMI success and each district should engage their clubs in NAMI projects throughout the year, including leadership development, club marketing and welcoming new members into their clubs.

18) What funding is available for NAMI districts?

Districts will use existing LCI and LCIF grants as well as district funds to implement their NAMI plans.


