

My VLC report this afternoon will be quite brief and will provide an update through December, 2020.(year end final)

(via zoom)

. Due to the times, our VLC accounts have experienced outstanding growth...largely due to the efforts of Lion Woody Stoddard...end of year total, our accounts total <u>\$481,455.95</u>. It would appear to me that this is a record high.

. Our budgeted income for the year was \$ <u>35,425.00</u> and through December, \$ <u>52,772.94</u>

. Our budgeted expense for the year was \$ <u>46200.00</u> and through December, we are \$ <u>63,384.23</u>

. As for VLC activity, we recently provided \$2500 in hearing aid assistance.

. Provided \$15000.00 to the Vermont Food Bank and will probably provide additional funds in the near future. Up-date as of today, the VLC Board approved an additional \$5000.00 for the Food Bank and also Provided an additional \$250.00 to the Granville Lions for distribution to the Granville, N.Y. food shelf. Thus, in total for the year, we have donated \$20,000 to the Vermont Food Bank and \$500 to the Granville Lions for distribution to the Granville food bank.

. We have provided \$11,295.00 in eyeglass assistance and 14,018.00 in other vision & hearing assistance for a total of \$ 25,313.00

. We have received \$8090.00 in club donations and \$24,281.80.00 in individual donations for a total of \$ 32,371.80(these figures include donations in stocks by Lion Doug Stuart.

. Our assistance in the area of pediatric cancer and those \$500 stipends have slowed a bit. We now have formed partnerships with the Boston Children's Hospital(part of the Dana Farber Cancer Institute) and the Baystate Children's Hospital in Springfield, MA.

In summary.....we have had a tremendous year having surpassed our budgeted income..however, we surpassed our budgeted expense by more then \$17,000.00...but, that's okay as we provided more in assistance.

Covid prevents us to meet in person..however, it has not affected our results as I believe we have surpassed our expectations for the year.

I do wish to thank the VLC Board for their efforts and commitment and in closing, Happy New Year & yes, keep well & safe.

- Vision We provide financial aid towards glasses and hearing aids. We hope to someday expand even further on this! - We've screened around 500 kids in our area in a combined effort with our sister club, Norshaft Lions
 - Youth We are committed to providing youth and young adults with opportunities to succeed; we provide scholarships towards college. We hold an annual back to school drive and have purchased school supplies, backpacks and lunch pails for our local schools.
- Diabetes This is a new focus area for LCI and we're working on promoting diabetes awareness in our community. More information coming soon!
- Childhood cancer we help raise money for pediatric cancer support, most recently through a bottle drive. We also collect bottle tabs for Shriner's.
 - The Environment We are proud to participate in Green up day every year!
- Hunger We hold an annual haunted house to benefit our amazing local food shelf. We've come in 1st and 2nd place in the Peanut Butter Jam Slam and we'll be collecting food for Food from the Heart in the coming weeks!

The Arlington Lion's Club is currently only about a dozen people!

We're proud of what just a small group of people can accomplish and hope to build on these efforts. We're so honored to be part of this amazing community and to be able to do our small part to keep it great!

<u>Report of the New England Lions Council Conference</u> <u>January 9, 2021</u> <u>On Line</u>

Following on from a successful Conference on October 24, 2020, President Bill Donnell opened our January 9th. with over 100 Lions attending. There was a very full agenda and I can only hope that many of you were able to be among the Lions from all over New England who participated.

Each of the District Governors presented a report of the activities of their district and there were so many activities that Lions have created to still serve during this time of Covid-19. It was exciting to hear about all the 'thinking outside the box' that is going on among our talented and committed Lions. Here are some of the activities and ideas shared:

New Virtual Clubs:

Paws of Comfort - Lion Deb Horner. This Club was developed by drawing together Lions who wanted to offer 'comfort dogs' who were trained to visit schools, nursing homes, veterans homes and hospitals. They are affiliated with the AKC and Therapy Dogs. They are growing to more than 20 members and have received many requests to visit.

New Leo Clubs that are Community - based: D33Y. These clubs will not be based in schools and make it more possible to have partnerships with community groups.

D23C working of virtual clubs using social media

Lioness Clubs are joining the local Lions Clubs in D44N

Districts are continuing to participate in the sight and hearing screening and donations, food bank donations and childhood cancer support


- Additional Ideas for Service:

- D23A St. Baldric Event on March 20th members are sponsored to donate their hair for wigs for cancer patients
- D33N raised funds for cancer research by placing toilets on the lawns of people to "flush away cancer' and accepting a donation to cancer research to take the toilets away.



"Service to others is the rent we pay for being on this Earth"




<u>PID Ed Farrington</u> reported that we have 73 new Clubs and 9 pilot zones for the North American Membership Program in our Region.

Empowering Community Service Leaders

NOTE: Lions University is offered by the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum. Questions or comments about Lions University should not be directed to Lions Clubs International Headquarters, but rather to the Support page.

As a Lions Club leader, you understand that building strong communities through volunteer service is our objective. The Lions University program is about making sure that you have the skills and resources to meet this objective.

Through three educational program levels, Lions Leaders will enhance their knowledge and skills to better serve their community.

To complete each program, Lions must complete 10 required courses, at least 5 elective classes, and complete specific leadership experiences. To complete a course, the Lion takes part in an hour long training session. These sessions are offered online on this website, through periodic webinars that are posted on this website, and through live sessions led in Districts and Multiple Districts.

Once the training session is completed, the Lion takes a simple online test to confirm their learning. Upon completion, the Lion is awarded a certificate of course completion. Lions are welcome to complete the courses that interest them in any of the programs, and in any order they wish. Credit is given toward the program that the class is under.

- Bachelor's Program: This program allows Lions to develop the skills necessary to lead a vital Lions Club. Courses are directed to the skills needed to be great club leader. Click here to learn more about this program.
- Master's Program: This program focuses on giving support to clubs through district leaders. This program is aimed at District Level leaders: District Governors, Vice District Governors, Zone Chairs, District Committee Chairs, Certified Guiding Lions, and other leaders that are ready to foster quality clubs in their District. - Doctorate Program: This program focuses on skills needed to be a training facilitator for adult volunteers. In affect, Lions who have completed the Doctorate Program are prepared to be great trainers of other Lions. Click here to learn more about this program.



Due to the continuing concerns about the coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic, the board of directors voted to transition the 2021 Montreal Lions Clubs International Convention to a virtual event that will be delivered totally online. This decision was made with the health and safety of our Lions, staff and vendors in mind as limiting international travel and large gatherings is key to global containment strategies.

Although we are disappointed that we won't be able to host this event in person, we are excited about hosting our first virtual international convention that can safely connect Lions from around the world. We are still finalizing the details of your new convention experience, and will share those with you as soon as they are ready.

Here are some important details about the 2021 virtual convention we'd like to share with you:

- Everyone's invited Our 2021 convention will be a virtual event that's open to all Lions and Leos around the world.
- Registration fees The registration fee will be US\$50 until March 31, then US\$75 beginning April 1. The registration fee for Leos will be US\$30 regardless of date. Convention is currently scheduled for June 25-29. Additional event and registration details will be provided soon.
- Current registrants Lions who are currently registered for convention will receive an email soon with more information about their registration options.
- Elections Executive officer and international director elections will be conducted electronically, and voting procedures will be forthcoming.
- Convention updates Check our convention website <u>LCICon</u> for convention updates and details as they become available.

This global health pandemic has forced us all to make decisions and changes that place health and safety first. However, we are optimistic that with each new day there is hope, and as Lions, we continue to find new ways to stay connected, safely serve our communities and continue our global mission of service.

Dear Lion Leader,

The coronavirus (COVID-19) pandemic is continuing to impact the work of Lions around the world. As you know, it has also created financial hardships for our Lions and the people for whom we care.

To support the incredible men and women serving with us, the International Board of Directors unanimously passed another resolution to help our clubs.

Here is an overview of the new resolution approved by the Board of Directors:

- Charter and entrance fees waiver We have waived all charter and entrance fees from January 1 through June 30, 2021.
- Flexible payments No clubs in good standing on December 31, 2020 will be suspended or canceled through June 30, 2021 for late payment of dues. Full payment is required to be received before June 30, 2021 to avoid suspension or cancellation.
 - Please note that clubs placed on financial suspension on December 31, 2020 will remain on suspension until the full balance is paid. Those clubs will still need to address their outstanding dues or make arrangements for repayment with the Accounts Receivable Department at Lions Clubs International to avoid cancellation scheduled for March 1, 2021.

These additional measures will help Lions facing financial hardships and give our clubs the support and encouragement they need during these challenging times. For more than a century, Lions have taken on the greatest challenges facing humanity, and together, we will overcome this.

The world needs Lions now more than ever, so thank you for your outstanding service and commitment to our communities and the world.





When a storm is coming, these animals have different survival techniques:


We A bear will eat everything around him, hide, sleep, and hope when he wakes the storm has passed.


