With all that being said, I wish you all a happy Valentine's Day, so go give an air-hug or two to your favorite Lion!





Lionism in Vermont – 'We Serve' since 1924

Origins of District 45

The world of Lionism came to Vermont in 1924 with the formation of the Burlington Lions Club. Such club was chartered September 17, 1924 with 30 members. The club, at that time, was part of District 33, sponsored by the Worcester Lions Club.

At that time, District 33 encompassed all of New Hampshire and Vermont, Western Massachusetts and a small section of Maine. In 1945, District 44 was formed, comprising Vermont and New Hampshire. Seven years later, in 1952, Multiple District 44, consisting of: District 44-A New Hampshire and District 44-B Vermont was formed.

In 1945, Multiple District 44 dissolved, and became two separate Districts: District 44 to be the State of New Hampshire and District 45 to be the State of Vermont.

The three oldest clubs currently in District 45 are: Springfield Lions Club – charted November 26, 1937, Barre Lions Club – chartered October 18, 1938 and the Bennington Lions Club – chartered February 9, 1939.

The three most recent clubs to be added to District 45 are the Londonderry Tri-Mountain Lions Club, Brattleboro Area Lions Club and, added via adoption but with a long history of Lionism, the Granville NY Lions Club.

Since 1924, there have been many Lions Clubs that have come and gone. At one time or another, the whole state has had a club. Presently, there are 33 Lions Club and approximately 1100 members.

'We Serve' Proudly done in District 45

"We Serve' – a great motto that Lions of District 45 take pride in. And the great part is that each and every club has their own distinctive way of doing community service.

Of course 'health' is our main service area. 'Health' being providing vision screening, diabetes testing, purchasing eyeglasses and hearing aids, providing funding for necessary health issues for the less fortunate. Not to get nostalgic, but back in 1977 – 1978, District 45 purchased a specially equipped van to replace a truck and trailer system to provide vision screening testing. Nowadays we use a piece of equipment that can be held in one hand (see report on vision screening). We have also been a major fundraiser for Campaign Sightfirst I and II providing funds to LCIF for such. And most recently, the NorShaft Lions Club has been a major player / contributor to the Guiding Eyes for the Blind in setting up an office in the Bennington area.

'We Serve' our communities in many ways, especially our youth. District 45 has been hosting a camp for deaf children and friends since 1983 in various places throughout the state. Staring at Camp <u>Ondawa</u> in Sunderland back in 1983, to many years at the former <u>Austine</u> campus in Brattleboro to our current site in Cabot Vermont, Green Mountain Lions Camp is one of, if not thee major, service project as a whole for District 45.

District 45 and its members are part of the Lions Twin State Soccer Association, host Peace Poster contests to where a District 45 winner is sent to the International Peace Poster contest, host a Speech Contest for high school students. But many of our clubs are the Charter Organization reps for Boy Scouts, host fishing derby's, basketball tournaments, Easter Egg hunts and much much

Yet we have not forgotten our communities as whole. Using funds from LCIF, clubs in our District have participated in Habitat for Humanity projects, been able to provide necessary materials for folks who have endured flooding, prepared package meals for local food shelf's, and even collected food during the 'food from the heart' food drives. Some clubs, go way and above the 'we serve' motto, like the Granville Lions Club in purchasing a building for their local food shelf. Some clubs even take over their town, like the Enosburg Falls Lions Club when they host the 'Dairy Days Festival' in Enosburg or the Norwich Lions Club when they host their 'annual fair' in July.

What about the communities where there are no Lions Club. Are they ignored by the Lions of District 45? Nope. Vermont Lions Charities, the 501 (c) (3) arm of District 45, is there to provide support for assistance as needed, whether buying eyeglasses or hearing aids, assistance to Vermont Association of the Blind that serves Vermonters throughout the state, or like the Grace Cottage Memorial Hospital in Townsend. Another example, would be the Troy and Area Lions Club, as representatives of Vermont Lions Charities, hosts a bingo in Morrisville to raise funds to purchase eyeglasses in Lamoille County. We help Special Olympics whether being volunteers at their 'games' or being part of the 'Opening Eyes Project' to provide glasses to the Olympians themselves. This and much, much more.

Even though things have change over the years from the beginning of Lionism here in Vermont to now; in the '<u>how</u>', the '<u>what</u>', the '<u>where</u>' we, as Lions are still know the '<u>why</u>': WE SERVE!!!

Our Afghan Allies Mission

On January 24th, the club voted *unanimously* to **help with** resettlement of our Afghan Allies, of which 100 are coming to Southern Vermont. LCI encourages clubs to take on this mission. And the Deerfield Valley Lions will need seven volunteers to do so – reaching out to other organizations, like Rotary and local churches in partnership, to fulfill this local humanitarian endeavor.

We learned of this mission from International Director John Youney at the January D45 cabinet meeting, where Lions have been asked by the US Government for help. LCI is set up to assist local clubs, and we're excited to be a Co-Sponsoring Group for the Afghan Allies Resettlement program. At least four other New England clubs are doing so as well. Locally, we're coordinating through Joe Wiah, the head of the resettlement agency MCC/ECDC in Brattleboro.

Lion Karen Hein is already fully engaged, making trips to the School for International Training (SIT) in Brattleboro to work with "her family."

Lion Jon Gaynin spoke passionately at our Go To Meeting. These are allies who put their lives at risk for the USA and – with Taliban in control – can't go home. We need to welcome them to our community. Humanitarian missions like these is what got Jon excited to join Lions in the first place.

And Lion Patience adds, "What someone from a different culture in a strange land need most is friends."

Dues Adjustment Resolution Will Be Voted on at 2022 International Convention

Dear Lion Leader,

Lions Clubs International supports clubs and members around the world so we can advance our global mission of service together. Our international support and the work of Lions Clubs International is fueled by the international dues of our incredible members.

In recent years, it has become increasingly clear that the services Lions Clubs International has been able to provide to members with the available budget is no longer in line with what Lions need and expect.

The International Board of Directors voted in October 2019 to approve an international dues adjustment resolution that would be voted on at the 2020 International Convention, but it was postponed due to the cancellation of our 2020 convention and the move to a virtual convention in 2021 as we adapted to the pandemic. *The new dues adjustment model will be voted on at the 2022 International Convention*.

The Board of Directors undertook an extensive review of Lions Clubs International's financials, including the implementation of substantial budget reductions. After much consideration, the board proposed to adjust dues S7 over a three-year period.

A dues adjustment will allow Lions Clubs International to provide improved support to Lions and to continue to invest in improving programs and digital products such as our website and MyLion. It will also allow us to invest in new programs such as the Learning Management System (LMS), development of new curriculum such as digital literacy, training videos, global advertising, marketing automation, digital and video storytelling and other tools and initiatives that will enhance our impact, our brand, and our membership.

Why your help is needed

Essentially, we have to decide whether or not we want Lions Clubs International to continue to grow and thrive. Lions is more than a way of life. It's also an investment of money, time, energy and passion. As with any good investment, the more we put in, the more returns we see. Under the proposal, international dues would be adjusted according to the following schedule:

- \$3 increase on July 1, 2023
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2024
- \$2 increase on July 1, 2025

Why an international dues adjustment is needed

We realize the association has been reluctant to adjust dues over the years, and we have not adjusted international dues since 2011. The proposed adjustment will help cover our costs and allow us to suitably serve our members' needs. With that said, the Board of Directors did not take this issue lightly, nor are we minimizing the value of each dollar that our members contribute.

As we consider this dues adjustment, it is essential that we keep in mind that our global efforts and initiatives support more than 1.4 million members in 50,000 clubs around the world. Through the support of staff, we are able to serve globally on the level that we do, keeping members and clubs fully supported with service resources, training events and software, club operational support, hybrid convention, international meetings, language services, technology, Foundation support, leadership support, and everything else we have come to expect as Lions.

We need you to help our members and leaders understand why this adjustment is needed. We have developed an <u>international dues</u> <u>adjustment FAQ and PPT</u> to help you present it to your Lions. If you have any questions on the dues adjustment resolution, please contact LCI Executive Administrator Sanjeev Ahuja.

I hope that you will see this adjustment as we do: as an investment in the future of Lions. Through your support, we can ensure that Lions are positioned for success in the future.

Lions Clubs International has been invited to participate in a historic opportunity to help more than 100,000 men, women and children from Afghanistan rebuild their lives in America. Participating clubs will receive support to help resettle allies, including \$2,275 per ally (additional grants may be available), online training and support from Lions International and resettlement partners.







Environment

- Plant trees with the advice of a local environment organization on the best locations and varieties.
- Clean up a beach, community space or roadside area monthly as a club.
- Hold an environment-themed photo contest at a school. Plant a tree or another green form of recognition to honor the winner.
- Challenge all Lions in your club or district to add one green habit to their daily lives.
- Work with city officials to paint "no dumping" signs near road drainage areas.
- Identify where to recycle toxic items and share the collection schedule.
- Organize a mural competition to promote environmental awareness. Paint the mural in a prominent community location.
- Implement a recycling drive where people donate gently-used items to charity organizations.
- Develop a demonstration garden or landscaping plot using native plant species to restore the habitat and conserve water.

- Recognize a local organization or community leader for environmental conservation work.
- 26. Volunteer with your local park service to maintain trails. Help more people access and enjoy nature!
- Commit to "Meatless Mondays" or not eating meat one day each week.
- Collect used cellphones and donate them to individuals in need.
- 29. Lead an after-school nature walk.
- Survey homes and community areas for leaks in sinks, communal spigots or water fountains. Contact relevant officials for repairs.
 - Sponsor a training program for farmers on how to make and use organic fertilizers and pesticides.
 - Produce a monthly nature program on a local public radio station.

On the sponsorship/partnership side - I believe I counted 35 clubs throughout Vermont. In doing some quick math, If each club contributed \$285.00 you could participate at the top level and we could make a big splash for Lions Clubs all over Vermont, because Green Up Day and our year-round programs are statewide. Here are some things we could additionally promote:

Engaging Youth and growing youth participation as leaders in their communities - Last year we started a mentor program and launched with 6 "teams" of Volunteer Town Coordinators paired with a high school student. A survey after last Green Up Day informed us that 36 towns wanted to get involved. The Lions Club, as a top partner would make a great tie-in for this.

Positive impact in our communities and our environment - we work year-round to engage members in their communities through Grants and further environmental stewardship. Working with the Lions on various project and ideas that will highlight both of us would be amazing for your programs, our environment and our state. We could potentially set an environmental trend for other states and other clubs.

In your video a comment struck me - "not your Grandfather's club." It is crucial to both of our organizations that we reach a more youthful audience and teach them to be present in giving back to their communities.
