District 45 Service as Reported to Lions Club International

As of September 28, 2022, 16,432 people have been served,, with 145 Service Activities Completed, 2,428 volunteer hours being provided, \$94,430 funds being donated and \$146,414 funds being raised.

As of September 24, 2022 District 45 membership is at 994.

District 45 has 32 clubs (including two branch clubs) and one Leos Club.





September Vision Screening Report 2022

It's September. The kids are back in school, and the vision screening program is gearing up! I've begun to receive reports from across the district with great numbers being reported already.

I am very excited to report that this year, I've begun to receive request from nurses asking if we would be able to screen their children! These are schools that are new to screening or have new nurses who have heard about our program from others in their field. In any event, the report is very promising which tells me we are doing something very right and the word is getting out there. Keep up all your great work and continue your excellent example of what we do best... WE SERVE.

On another note, I mentioned in a previous report that I need to have the screening teams do something a little different this year when collecting the basic information when the camera's prompt you to ask the child's age. If you can PLEASE, keep track of the number of each age. I'm imagining some groans, but it is really quite simple. One example is to write the numbers 1-? (Whatever age groups you're doing that day) on a piece of scrap paper and when you ask the child's age, tick off under that number. Then add them all up afterwards and send it along with your other information. It shouldn't take but a couple of minutes. Feel free to do it any way works the easiest for you. This is something that enables me to submit more accurate data to Kids Sight when entering the district information into their system. Up until now I've guessed as to the actual ages, but now I feel we should be sending more accurate data. Thank you for your understanding. Tips & Ideas to Enhance Your Lions Club





 $m{Y}$ ou're someone new to town. You don't really know anyone. You wish to become active in your community and meet new friends; maybe join a service club.

You could look up organizations that come to mind: Kiwanis, Rotary, Red Cross, etc. Or, as you pass our big yellow and blue "L" symbol at your town line, you would see that there is a Lions option. This signage is an important means to set the tone as an **Open**, **Friendly**, and **Integral** part of the community. It's a tool for growth.

But then you wonder, "They think I'm going to drop in 'cold' on a Lions meeting "Tuesdays at 7PM - Ruth's Restaurant"?

No – nowadays a stranger doesn't "pop in" like that (if they aren't already a Lion elsewhere). So, it's not really all that welcoming. But that is how Lions signage has been posted traditionally. It needn't be. Unfortunately, wording below these Lions emblems isn't in keeping with the times, as seen in this example on the LCI website!



We want folks to join us. But guests need a personal invitation. So, how do they connect with a Lions person?



Using an email address



People have lots of options. Why Lions? Our tagline.



Using a website

Boosting our connections with the public by adding a website, a club email address, a club cell phone number or QR Code to our "Welcome" signage will update your club's image and give people a more welcoming feeling. How about we make the best use of that truly valuable space and give folks a quick, handy resource to initiate a connection with us?

Our website is a more appropriate means to post our sites & times for todays' meetings. More importantly, it will have a "Contact Us!" page. And, being inviting and exciting, it'll draw people in; tell why they should be a part of the fun.

It offers much more of a "call to action" than saying 'some older folks gather for a meal at Ruth's @ 7PM.' It'll engage active people without the time for more meetings, those who don't want the meal (for lots of reasons) or the drive home from the restaurant in the dark. It implies there may be the convenience of a "virtual option" (like many clubs are doing nowadays) which - like it or not - is the way business is being done in today's world. It says, "Let's connect!"

There are many small ways that we can connect with the public that all add up. This is just one example. Be creative.

Scam / Phishing / Fraudulant Emails!!!

Fellow Lions,

In the past few weeks, some of us have received fraudulent emails asking us to purchase gift cards or to wire funds out of club or district accounts. These emails are from criminals and you should know what to look for if you receive such an email. It is especially important that *any newly appointed officer* is made aware of these emails so that no one becomes a victim.

Here are a few tips:

- The emails purport to be from someone you know, and some of the emails I received contained names of other District Lions which, at first glance gives them a certain degree of credibility.
- The email request that I received was for me to buy gift cards for Veterans for which I will be reimbursed. The scam is that they want the numbers on the gift cards and I will never see any reimbursement. The emails related to Lions that I see are related to our charitable purpose, the ones I receive at work are work related so these criminals are definitely doing their homework.
- The email usually says to only contact the sender by return email because they are in meetings or are otherwise occupied. The emails received by other Lions from the "fake me" stated that I had a family emergency and was only reachable by email.
 - Click on the sender's name and look closely at the actual email address; you will probably see that it is not the real address of the sender but may be a close facsimile.
 - Do not respond to the email, however tempting it might be. You will only prove to the sender that he has your attention.
 - Make it club policy for the treasurer to directly phone the officer (not the number given in the email or text!) who seems to be requesting monies. Confirm by voice before anything.
 - Only pay for items already in the club's budget (at the dollar amount budgeted, and at the time of year that is expected). _
 - If you can, remove individual email addresses and cell numbers from the "Contact Page" on your club's website or Facebook page, and replace it with a single, club-owned email (such as contact XYZLions@gmail.com) or a club-owned phone number that is controlled by the club president or other officer. This type of public information is easy to find and may be the source for criminals knowing our names and contact information.
 - Bring this topic up at your next club meeting, so all are aware.
- Request a <u>Better Business Bureau</u> speaker come talk to your club about "Scams & Frauds" at an upcoming Club meeting. The New England BBB does this service free, and it is very interesting and informative for all, including the public at large who are invited to attend.
 - If your club has become a victim, report it to me as well as local authorities.

This type of email has been happening for some time, sometimes several times a year, and I want to be sure we are all aware of this scam. Please contact me with any further questions.
