


The District 45 Vision Screening program is well underway with almost 4000 students being screened so far this year with approximately 470 students being referred. This is with 6 clubs reports to date, a great beginning.

I wish to share a letter that was forwarded to me by Lion Randy Bigelow. For those who know me, I get very emotional when speaking about my commitment to vision screening or my family. You can imagine my reaction to reading this:

“Good morning!

A huge thank you to you and the school for doing the eye exam. (My daughter) passed with flying colors at the doctor's Monday so we would have never known. She had an eye exam this am and sure enough the right one is struggling. He (the eye doctor) mentioned it's great it was caught early as she may have completely lost function in it over time. She will be wearing special glasses at home a few hours a day to strengthen it.

So thank you so much!

I do not know this child's age or where she lives, but it is the perfect example of why we Lions do what we do. We serve! With months of screenings to go, I send my thanks to all the vision screening teams who take time out of their busy schedules to make sure our children get the best possible vision prevention and can offer. International / New England News

TALES OF THE SERVICE TRAIL UPDATE November 2022

What has happened around here? We seem to have missed Maine's glorious autumn! And we heard it was full of color - reds, oranges, yellows and even purples - all despite a summer drought that foretold no color! But Mother Nature defied the rain gods. Somehow Karol and I missed most of it this year. Oh yeah ... Lions work and travels!

We saw many of you in Calgary at the USA/Canada Lions Leadership Forum, just as those pesky leaves started thinking about stopping their photosynthesis. On our return, the weather warmed again until the last week of September. But Karol and I flew out to the Board meeting in Minneapolis on Saturday, October 1.

As chair of the Constitution and By-Laws committee, my meetings started with General Counsel on Sunday to go over the committee agenda one last time. We only talk about every other week but things move fast and change even faster it seems. The work sessions started at 7:20 the next morning and continued until late Thursday. I urge each of you to review the executive summary for the summary of all action. One important decision originated in CBL that affects many districts around the world. Currently, to stand for ID, you must come from a district with at least 1250 members and 35 clubs. In Boston at LCICON 2023, you will vote on a proposed change to eliminate the district size requirements to be nominated for ID. Since 48% of the clubs in CA I, and similar issues in CA II(Canada) and CA IV(Europe), we are not necessarily able to elect our best and brightest Lions all the time to the Board. This allows the process to be opened to all Lions.

On Thursday, Karol and I traveled to Duluth, MN, with many of our fellow directors and spouses to do Board projects in the community as well as do some team building events. What could go wrong with a team ax throwing competition? ... in a beer hall ...

Duluth is on the shores of Lake Superior, with a terrain and climate similar to Maine! And that lake - it looks like the ocean but very little tides. We did see mega-ships in and out of the harbor. Many of the "lakers" carry coal and iron ore still through the Great Lakes. A large trestle bridge raises and lowers at all hours for the super boats to arrive and leave. The largest we saw was 750' long, but some are 1000'! By the way, the trees along the shore had glorious yellows on all the birches!

The projects included serving for a morning at a homeless center distributing sleeping bags, blankets, jackets, clothes, underwear, socks, gloves, hat, and toiletries to several hundred people. It was a stark reminder of service to those in need, as well a great example of how partnerships can work with Lions providing manpower to do the major distribution work for the center. It was heartwarming to see Lions helping people try on coats as though it was a Macys or Nordstroms. The looks and words of joy warmed our souls.

From Duluth, Karol and I flew to British Columbia and the MD 19 annual convention in Penticton. This was the first time in three years that the Lions of Washington, Northern Idaho, and BC were able to all assemble as one. And the joy was on everyone's faces as they greeted old friends with handshakes, and not waves in the 2"x2" box on a screen any longer. The MD's redistricting plan to drop from 9 sub-districts to 5 had been approved at the Board meeting days earlier. The theme was "Back to the Future", which was very prophetic. Many of the combined districts had been one before splitting in the 70's and 80's when their growth had soared. The redistricting was done without changing any zones, and the cross-border districts remained international. Both were essential to most of the MD Lions. Many sessions were on the mechanics of how to complete the redistricting, and elect new officers in time for DGE school!

The 16 day trip became 17 days when an airline stranded us in LaGuardia when we expected to be home soon after midnight.. But that is travel nowadays. The worst part of the trip home was flying into Bangor during the daylight and seeing that all the leaves were dull yellows and browns!

Next we are off to the Hudson Valley and MD 20-O for their convention. Then we can do local projects again and enjoy the holidays.

For several months, I have closed each "Tales" with ten ideas for finding new members (totally stolen from other Lions). The response continues warming, so here are ten more ideas:

- 81. Have members constantly promote and rave about the club.*
- 82. Meet at a good location.*
- 83. Make recruitment teams to compete for the most new members!*
- 84. Develop a strategic membership plan - growth needs to be planned.*
- 85. Reward Lions for new members - free dinner?.*
- 86. Have a poster showing new members/sponsors at meetings.*
- 87. Find new members in work careers not found in your club.*
- 88. Use a thermometer chart showing growth to your membership goal.*
- 89. Feature a member benefit in each newsletter.*
- 90. Induct new members with pizazz, and invite spouses or partners.*



HISTORY

The Essex Junction Lions Club was organized on December 18, 1947 and was chartered on February 5, 1948. Our sponsoring club was the Burlington Lions Club. Charter president was Herman Warner and charter secretary was Phillip McCausland. There were 52 charter members.

We are proud to be the sponsor of three clubs, Colchester, Jericho-Underhill and Winooski.

Over the years, our main fundraising projects have been the Horse Show, which continued for 50 years and the Food Booth, still ongoing, both located on the Champlain Valley Fair Grounds. These projects have significantly contributed financially to support many community projects.

One of the first major Essex Junction service projects was building the municipal swimming pool on Maple Street. In 1989, the Club purchased material, built and installed a "game field" course with 20 exercise stations along a 2.5 mile closed loop path, which runs through the Essex Town forest. We have erected monuments for Veterans of World War II, Korea and Vietnam, and we participate in the annual Memorial Day ceremonies and parade. In 1997, we initiated a project to install signs at the Village borders identifying all the service organizations.

As its World Service Day projects, the Club has contributed labor for planting trees along streets in the Village, for spring cleaning at Stevens Park and for installing equipment at Cascade Park. The Club is also a major contributor to the Essex Rescue with key donations for two ambulances and a defibrillator. We also continue our support of the Village and Town Libraries, the Discovery Museum, Senior Citizen Groups and Meals on Wheels. Other service projects include preparing and serving meals at food shelters and diabetes screening in the community.

One of the most rewarding human service projects was the annual Christmas party for the Medical Center Nursing Home unit, averaging 40 patients, all elderly and severely impaired. This continued until the unit was closed. The Club also assisted the participants of the National Special Olympic Games while they were being outfitted for the Winter Games held at Smugglers Notch. In more recent years we have conducted vision screenings at the Summer Games at UVM.

In the area of Sight & Hearing, we continue to furnish medical eye exams and glasses to those in need in Essex and surrounding areas. We purchased a vision screener to be used in schools and in the community. Also in conjunction with District 45, we were able to place a TTY machine for a

hearing impaired person and have placed several machines to help IBM employees.

The Club continues to support the Twin State Soccer program. The Club has also been a generous supporter of the Green Mountain Lions Camp and is a 100% contributor to LCIF.

International activities include maintaining an annual youth exchange with Lancaster, England Lions club for nearly twenty years. The twinning program included a relationship with the Lions Clubs of Terrebonne and Napierville, Canada. A variety of visitations occurred, and a boisterous camaraderie prevailed at these meetings, which cemented good feelings on an individual as well as a club level.

The Essex Club received the 100% Club Award many times and was number one Club on many occasions over the years.
