Global Service Team Chairperson Report District 45

February, 2023

After many times contemplating the question of what activities are "reportable" to International for credit toward service performed by club members, I finally decided to go to an experienced service reporter for the answer. I contacted Lion Hilary Kumnick, PCC/LCIP, Global Action Team (GAT) Leader for the New England area. He is also the President of NELC. He's responsible for several districts and is reporter for his own club.

After reviewing his response at length, I pass it along to you.

Anyone performing service at a Lion event or activity, whether they are a Lion or not, can have their service hours included. All meeting, fundraiser, event, zone, district and international participation can be reported. If a club has a Zone chair or any district officer among them, that club secretary should make sure those hours are also reported. The secretary or the individual officer can do this reporting as can individual Lions report their own. When members attend Zone meetings, trainings, district events of any kind, it gets reported. This includes drive time and preparation time.

Any time a club involves non-Lions such as a spouse, partner, child, scout troop, historical society, or anyone else who helps out with a Lion fundraiser or Lions event, they may be included in reporting.

All Lion activities, no matter how one may define them, are reportable and should be. If five of your club Lions attend a district or International level conference, institute, forum or training, that's service to our cause and should be reported. Lion Hilary reports all his time spent at GAT, district, NELC, Zone, Club etc....functions. He also reports time for the preparation he does for the many activities he has almost daily.

So, from sitting with a senior for an hour over coffee, putting up a tent in preparation for a Lion event, to driving around gathering prizes for a fundraiser then documenting that activity, or putting in hours to find and getting a wheelchair for someone, every single thing connected with Lions activities is reportable. It all reflects who we are and what we do to make our communities better. I realize, too, that there are always situations that do not fall into the proper reporting "slot", but that's when "other" is necessary. Use it if you need to, even if most of your reporting falls under this category.

Below is a short list of service ideas I gathered from reports from clubs throughout the district. Great ideas that can possibly start the ball rolling in your club.

In certain situations it's "Location, location, location". For Lions, it's "Document, document, document"! If you have any questions about reporting something, please feel free to contact me at <u>tallships53@gmail.com</u> or call me at 802-875-2990.

Lions Clubs unite to help feed hungry Vermonters



BARRE, Vt. (WCAX) -Vermont's lions clubs joined forces in barre Saturday to help feed the hungry.

According to the Vermont Food Bank, about 150,000 Vermonters turn to food banks and meal programs to feed themselves.

As part of their outreach program, clubs came together to package meals for the Food Bank and other local food shelves.

The group put together twenty thousand meals.

They say they do this event every year as a way to help those in need.

"This is who we are. I personally get a tremendous sense of personal fulfillment doing community service, said Lions Club member, Kathy Dorman. "I think for every lion, we all do this. This is what makes us continue, is service to our community."

Lions Club International is a community service group that has 32 clubs across the state.

Guiding Lion Program

Designed for New, Existing and Clubs Rebuilding

The Guiding Lion Program is designed to assist clubs that are newly chartered, established or rebuilding. Guiding Lions are assigned for a two-year term by the district governor in consultation with the sponsoring or established club president. Guiding Lions are limited to serving no more than two new clubs at any point in time.

Guiding Lions assist a club to:

- Be successful in its first two years of operation
- · Orient and train club officers and members
- · Motivate and support club growth and development
- Locate resources available to assist the club

There will be a further announcement at the January meeting:

During the month of March, District 45 will be holding a **training for Guiding Lions**, led by PDG Liz Fenwick

PDG Liz would like for all members to think about this training. It will contain a great deal of good information that will be of use to every Club member in D45 and especially Club Officers, even if you are not considering being a Guiding Lion at the moment. Also, there may be Lions who will need to update their certification to be a Guiding Lion.

The first session will be held at the March Cabinet Meeting, followed by two other Zoom meetings in the month of March (dates and times to be determined), to complete the course. There is a short quiz to be taken at the end of the course.



PULL TAB UPDATE



Well let's see

It has been since the 2014 – 2015 Lions year that we started collecting pull tabs and sending them to the Shriners for their Children's Hospitals. Over the last 8 years, we (District 45), have collected a total of 1,601.477 pounds.

So far in in the 2022 – 2023 Lions year, there are 15 clubs from the district participating. Such clubs are: Arlington, Brandon – Forest Dale, Brattleboro Area, Colchester, Deerfield Valley, Essex Junction, Jericho-Underhill, Londonderry Area Tri-Mountain, NorShaft, Norwich, Springfield, Troy and Area, Vergennes, Williston Area and Windsor. We would like to welcome, new in joining collecting pull tabs, are the Filipino American Branch Club of the Barre Lions. IF your club is not listed, how about joining the collection?

I will be collecting pull tabs for this year's awards. Just get any pull tabs to me no later than April 1st (no fooling). Your club can bring them to the March cabinet meeting or ship them to me so as to be received no later than by that date (April 1st!!!!).

So far this year, we have collected a total of 108+ pounds from the clubs listed. Get those pull tabs to me so we all can beat last year's poundage (222.641 pounds).

P.S. Here are two additional pieces of information from the Shriners in regards to the pull tab program:

What is the 'Pull-tab Collection Program'?

Pull-tabs or 'pop-tops', from beverage (and other types) cans can be saved and donated to your local Shriners. The tabs are sold to a recycling company and the money collected is used at the hospitals to buy different items. There is a wheelchair funds, and other aids for the children, and sometimes recreational items such as games and movies.

Shriners Hospitals for Children is a health care system of 22 hospitals dedicated to improving the lives of children by providing pediatric specialty care, innovative research, and outstanding teaching programs for medical professionals. Children up to age 18 with orthopedic conditions, buns, spinal cord injuries and cleft lip and palate are eligible for car and receive all services in a family-centered environment, regardless of the patients ability to pay.

Why collect the pull-tab and not the entire can?

Aluminum has recycling value and the tab is the only pure aluminum part of the can. The can itself can be returned for the deposit (in states that have can and bottle deposit laws, including Vermont) after the tab has been removed.





- Log in to the current member portal with your Lion Account credentials
- Navigate to MyLCI
- Select "My Lions Club"
- Select "Members"
- Click on the member whose information you need to update.
- Select "Edit Member" to enter in their revised email address and other updated information.

With the new Member Portal implementation coming soon, now would be a good time to review your member data to insure that it is up to date. 


