The Troy and Area Lions Club, together with Knights of Columbus, sponsors quarterly blood drives for the Red Cross at the Westfield Community Center. Our normal collection is between 25 and 30 pints, a very good result for our small community.

Our last drive on March 11 had 37 donors registered — a record number for Westfield! But Mother Nature sent us a snowstorm and consequently we had a record number of cancellations and no-shows instead. So, we only got 16 units of blood, which was a disappointment but still potentially 16 lives saved, so a success nonetheless.

We are very fortunate to have so much support from our community— our loyal blood donors, wonderful Lions volunteers, top-notch Red Cross staff, Knights of Columbus volunteers who take care of the banner and the posters, and local businesses who provide us with a door prize for our raffle every time.

And now, with the critical shortage in the blood supply nationwide, we are getting ready to step up our efforts to help even more. As of this June, we are planning to increase our blood drives in Westfield to every 2 months. An informal poll of our dedicated donors received a resounding positive response to this change.





TALES OF THE POST-SERVICE TRAIL UPDATE

MARCH 2024

Karol and I spent last weekend doing a Lions project that is available to each of us every March! We attended Lions Day at the United Nations! It is a wonderful program that celebrates our partnership with the United Nations from its founding. When President Roosevelt called nations together in1945 to organize so as to prevent a World War three, Lions were there with Melvin Jones assisting. We were then asked to found the Non-Governmental Organization (NGO) of the United Nations. We are among a small handful of non-state members of the UN. While we do not have a vote like member states do, we have 15 Lions who serve on UN committees and do have full participation,

This year, Karol and I arrived by 1pm, and promptly attended a training session by the UN training staff on Advocacy. We learned how to tie environmental stewardship into small scale international development to combat poverty.

The real basic idea is that if the environmental arm of a state receives a grant to preserve a span of nature, it invariably creates a national park that removes indigenous peoples from the area, increasing their poverty as well as making them refugees without homes. But if the money goes into economic development tied to the environment, the local people remain but with life changes, such as solar ovens so that there is no need for the women to cut every tree for miles around just for cooking. That loss of trees causes contamination of wells, so the women and children then have to walk for miles to carry home potable water. Once the time working on such basics is reduced, then a craft or other business is developed. In Malawi, one village built 5 greenhouses and now raise all the vegetables for the village and sell a surplus to neighboring villages. With that new money, the children get a chance for education! Now that is Advocacy at work. These tools are not limited in their use to African villages and countries but can apply to projects right here in the USA. It is a process that will get results.

That night we had dinner with other attendees, several UN ambassadors, and staff, and Lions from around the world. The ambassador from Sri Lanka spent much time talking with me before dinner in English better than my own! He is a lawyer, so we had that in common. But also, was a politician, then Supreme Court justice but had to retire at 65 (term limits by age!) and now the UN permanent representative.

Friday was the traditional LDUN agenda with presentations from ambassadors, UN staff, and Lions on UN committees telling us of the works in progress. We also were the first to learn who the winner of the Lions Peace essay contest is this year and saw the Peace Poster that is this year's Grand Prize winner. Go to lionsclubs.com to see the absolutely stunning art by an eleven-year-old from China!

By the way, if you cannot make it to NYC, or just want a more worldly flavor, LDUN is done in Vienna/Geneva (even/odd years) and Nairobi each year.

But NYC was our choice for several reasons. Concord Trailways has an executive bus from Portland to NYC every morning, with only 3 seats across which are wider than airline seats and very comfortable and with a kitchenette at the back fully stocked with pastries, fruit, juices, water, soda, coffee, and tea! All for a round trip price that was less than our 4 days of parking would have been! And the bus stops across the street from the UN and a block-and-a-half from the Westin Grand Central where we were!

Yes, 4 days! You see, the Karol rule is days of Lions gets her days of additional events, when possible. Well, Saturday saw us with Lions from NJ with whom we served on the Board, Jeff and Ellyn Gans, at a matinee performance of "Chicago"! A leisurely and delicious Italian dinner across the street from the Westin made for a great day with friends.

Karol and I thank all of you again for this honor to serve Lions and the world. We trust that we do our best to represent all Lions worldwide and can continue this service to you wherever we are needed.



Dear Lion Leader,

Lions and Leos take action to make our communities better. We lead with kindness, make a lasting impact and change lives. As a service leader, you may be asked questions about club service. Some common questions are:

What types of service do clubs provide? Each club chooses how they serve to meet community needs. The types of service are:

- Service activities, such as vision screening, tree planting and serving meals
- Advocacy, which includes community awareness and education, legislation and public policy
- Donations to individuals and organizations, including Lions
 Clubs International Foundation
- Fundraising, when money is collected to enable service
- Service support activities, such as meetings, events and administrative tasks that enable service

How do we count the number of people served? Often, measuring service impact is straightforward. For example, if your club hosts a diabetes educational event, just count the number of people who attend. However, counting beneficiaries for activities like caring for our environment can be more challenging. If your club is planning an activity in support of Earth Day, April 22, and has questions about counting the people served, you can find answers in the Measuring Service Impact resource available from the Service Reporting webpage.

Dear Lions and Leos,

Preparation is underway to begin rolling out the new Lion Portal. Here is some important information to prepare you for launch.

Phased rollout for Lion Account Users

Our target launch window is April 15 – May 13*. During this time, all current Lion Account users will receive an email inviting them to access the new Lion Portal**. We're doing this phased rollout to ensure staff are available to provide the best support possible and offer you a positive introductory experience.

- Now April 11: MyLion, MyLCI and Insights will continue to function as normal.
- April 12 and beyond: MyLion, MyLCI and Insights are no longer available.
- April 15 May 13: Invitations to access the new Lion Portal sent via email on a rolling basis to existing Lion Account users.
 - Please note: User permissions will not change. In other words, those who can report service, access member data and other key functions remains the same.
- May 13 and beyond: All visitors attempting to access the previous digital tools will be automatically redirected to the new Lion Portal.

*Dates are subject to change. Our number one goal is to create a positive experience for Lions and Leos. If determined more time is required to ensure the product is in an optimal state, the dates may be adjusted accordingly.

**If you don't see the email in your everyday inbox, please check all spam and junk folders for it first before contacting Member Support.

Note that the new Lion Portal will require a unique, unshared email, and phone numbers will no longer be supported as a log in credential.

JUDGE ANTHONY W. PARADISO INTERNATIONAL DIRECTOR

Judge Anthony W. Paradiso from Rockville Centre, New York, USA, was elected to serve a twoyear term as an international director of Lions Clubs International at the association's 105th International Convention in Boston, Massachusetts, USA, July 7 through July 11, 2023.

Director Paradiso has more than 30 years of law experience and is currently a district court judge responsible for the adjudication of criminal cases in Nassau County, New York.

Looking for an opportunity to give back to his community for the scholarships that allowed him to attend college and later, law school, he was drawn to the service that Lions were providing. He joined the Rockville Centre Lions Club in 1996 where he has continuously served ever since. In addition to his leadership at the district level, he has held a number off offices within the association including multiple district council parliamentarian.
