Food from the Heart

It began last year on a small scale; in 2010 this program goes state wide, all of District 45. Program chair PID Tom Broughton is requesting all clubs participate in collecting foods and household items on Saturday, February 13. DG Bruce Bushey has made this program a priority for District 45 this year.

All clubs should have received an information flier and poster to help with your "food raising" program. You conduct this program at your local grocery store for the benefit of your local food shelf. With today's economic hard times, more and more people find themselves in need of a helping hand. We, as Lions, have the strength and ability to help our neighbors in times of need. After a cold December and January, the needs have been met, but the food supplies are depleted at the food shelf.

How does this work? Your club should



advertise the program in the local papers and make sure folks know what the Lions are doing on February 13. A good public service announcement (PSA) in the paper or even on local radio station is a

great way to get the word out. Arrange with the grocery store to be part of their day on February 13.

The secret to making this work is having Lions in place, all day, at the store. They will hand out "the list" of needed food or household items. The list reminds shoppers what to buy to contribute to the food shelf needs. We are asking shoppers to contribute what they are comfortable with, as they will be purchasing these items to donate. Make sure your Lions are wearing a Lions vest to be identified.

The job, at the end of the day, is simply to deliver the collected items to the food shelf. PID Broughton says that we can get more than 40,000 lbs. of food items if all 40 clubs participate. This is an excellent way for clubs of all sizes to make a large impact on the community; with a modest investment of quality time working together with your fellow Lions. Working in pairs, two hour shifts would certainly not be overwhelming to any Lion. Make sure you have enough "lists" to hand out.
