



Eye Glass Recycling Instructions

We need your assistance again. At the last Cabinet meeting clubs did a terrific job turning in their eyeglasses for recycling, but we made work for the Vergennes Lions because not all clubs prepped their donations as necessary.

- 1) We want eyeglasses not cases. Remove any eyeglass cases and discard or recycle the cases. We only need the eyeglasses to be turned in.
- 2) Write your FULL Club Name and the count of glasses in the box on the outside of the box. These boxes will be transported in the back of a pickup at 72 mph...any loose note will be blown away...and at least one was.
- 3) **Seal the box firmly for transport.** The box will not be opened until it gets to New Jersey so ensure that only glasses are inside.

Finally many folks were asking for an address so that they could hand deliver their glasses. The district's glasses are being consolidated at Lion Brad Howe's home in Vergennes. The physical address (not the mailing address) is 125 Sunset Knoll, Vergennes, VT. Please call Brad at 802-759-2141 prior to delivering to ensure that he will be there to receive.

Lion Randy from Middlebury Lions will continue to transport glasses from cabinet meetings to Brad's home, so feel free to continue to bring them to cabinet meetings. You can even bring them to the spring convention, but those won't count for this year's total for competition purposes...but they will count toward next year's competition.

For each coin sold, US\$10 is authorized to be paid to LCIF. These collectable coins make great gifts for family and friends and are the perfect way to show appreciation to your club members for outstanding service. Purchase from the Lions Store or directly from the US Mint.



Questions & Answers

When will I be able to purchase a Lions Centennial Coin?

Coins will be available beginning in January 2017 and ending in December 2017 (or when they sell out, whichever comes first). The exact dates will be added to the Coin webpage as soon as they are known.

How many coins will be produced?

The United States Mint will produce up to 400,000 Lions Centennial Coins. Even if they sell out quickly, no additional coins will be created.

How can I purchase the coins?

Starting on the first day of sale, you will be able to buy coins from Lions Club Supplies or the United States Mint. Coins cannot be reserved in advance; they will be sold on a first-come, first-served basis.

How much will the coins cost?

Due to the variability of pricing on the precious metal markets, prices for products containing silver are subject to change. We will publish the price as soon as it is determined. Keep in mind that shipping fees, plus any applicable duty and taxes will be additional.

Can I purchase more than one coin?

You may purchase as many coins as you would like, providing there is sufficient inventory. In some cases, clubs, districts, or countries may choose to make bulk purchases and distribute the coins locally.

Can you provide the coin specifics?

The Lions Clubs Centennial coin is US\$1 legal tender. Each is composed of 90% silver and 10% copper. The weight is 26.730 grams and diameter is 1.5 inches (3.81 cm) with a reeded edge.

What finishes will be available?

You can choose either an uncirculated or proof finish. Uncirculated coins are hand-loaded into the coining press and struck on specially burnished blanks, yet have a soft, matt-like finish appearance. These coins are made like circulating coins (which are used every day as money), but with a special process that produces a brilliant finish. Proof coins receive the highest quality strike possible and can be distinguished by their mirror-like background and frosted foreground.

Will Lions Clubs International make money on the purchase of these Centennial coins? US\$10.00 is authorized to be paid to Lions Clubs International Foundation for every coin sold for a maximum of US\$4 million if all 400,000 coins are sold.

LCI QUEST

A note to all members from Lion George and Lion Liz

One of the most important initial things that we do as Lions is to support our local communities, looking at needs and working to meet those needs. Many of us have worked for years to raise funds to support the needy in our towns, providing glasses and hearing aids, food to the Food Pantries, scholarships to our high school graduates, care and support to our veterans and senior citizens and volunteering on many fronts to make a difference to those in our communities. We have stood up, stepped forward, served and made a real difference.

Today our communities are faced with a stronger challenge than ever before. This is a challenge to our children in the form of illicit drugs, bullying, cyber bullying and strong peer pressure. We are all aware of the stress that is put on our children to achieve at school, socially and to head for a college place or training. There are high expectations but not as much of the support / mentoring and guidance for them - as there may have been for us, as we went through this difficult time of our lives. We, as Lions, working with other leaders of our communities, can offer this support to our young people through such a program as Lions Quest.

How can this be done? First it is important to look closely at your communities, talk to parents, schools, and police to clarify the challenges that our children and young people face in our towns and villages. When you have a clear idea of the needs, look closely at the Lions Quest program and see if there is a match: needs of our communities and the content of the program.

Information on the Lions Quest Program can be accessed on the Lions website, under LCIF – then programs – then youth – and Lions Quest. These drop- down menus will lead you to information on the program.

These programs are not something that one club can do by itself, but with support from LCIF (grants, training, information) and District 45, we can plan to build the network to make a difference to our children – the 'seed corn' of our future.

VERMONT LIONS CHARITIES Up-date for 2016 year

To all District 45 Lions: My VLC reports are provided at all District 45 Cabinet meetings and while attendance is fine, my message fails to reach all members; so, here is my attempt to provide a VLC up-date for 2016.

Providing a bit of history...Vermont Lions Charities was formed at our 1994 Fall Conference with election of officers at our 1995 Conference. In stating a section of our Constitution & By-Laws and being a 501 c 3, our main purpose is to receive "tax deductible" donations, apply for grants, receive proceeds from D-45 fund raisers and to distribute funds to various committees to fund their charitable activities. One of our major commitments is to reach out to help individuals in those areas of the state that are not currently covered by a Lions club; specifically in the area of eye glasses & hearing aid assistance. In supporting our annual budget, we conduct fund raisers throughout the year; fund raisers such as our annual Walk-for Sight, cash fest raffle, a Texas-hold'em tournament & bingo(both sponsored by the Troy & Area Lions Club) and our first VLC Money Grows on Trees raffle.

This Communiqué' article is designed to provide the history relating VLC's SHARED VISION FUND and the 500 CLUB. Back in the early 2000's, PID Jules Cote and Lion Jackie donated the sum of \$6700; designed to start up a vision fund with-in VLC. These funds were the result of donations provided via the homecoming held at the conclusion

of PID Jules term as International Director. In 2006, a couple, in memory of their daughter who had passed away, offered to donate the sum of \$50,000 and in turn, issued a challenge to our District...in order to receive these funds, District 45 would need to raise matching funds.

At our 2007 Spring Convention, we, as a District, matched the original donation and as a result, the SHARED VISION FUND was created and included the \$6700 donated by PID Jules & Jackie and for the record, the donor of the original amount remains anonymous.

In addition, the Shared Vision Fund includes the 500 Club. A \$500 donation to the Shared Vision Fund by a club or individual enables the donor to name an individual to become a member of the 500 club and at this point in time, the 500 Club has (77) members with (23) remaining pins to honor future recipients. As for the (77) members, I am in the process of trying up-date the records and need to locate (11) members. THIS IS WHERE I NEED YOUR HELP. I am providing a current list of the 500 Club membership. 
