Happy New Year Vermont Lions; a special thank you for your efforts to make our district so successful! Our reports show that the district increased membership to 1251 last fall. We've a way to go, but we are heading in the right direction. Letting our Beacon of Hope Shine is the challenge we received from our International President. Tell your community and the world what we, as Lions, are doing. It will help to recruit members and advance work of Lionism in our communities. As I said in the last Communiqué, "It doesn't

matter how big or small the project is, but informs the community; the Lions do give back." *Let the Beacon of Hope Shine!*

Retention is a big concern of any Lions district or club. While visiting clubs, I am asked what can be done to bring members back to monthly meetings, or participate in activities. There could be several reasons why members disappear. It could be conflict between members, a feeling of not being important in the club, perhaps they don't like the way the club is run. Consider surveying your club members with a questionaire; seek their opinions about what would make the meetings better or more interesting. You might have to mail this to each member, handing it out at a regular meeting, is probably not going to get it in the right hands. Get ready for some surprise answers.

Be prepared to listen to new members' ideas about the current club projects or maybe an idea about a new club project. I talked with a new member last fall, who was already discouraged because, "the chair person wouldn't listen to a new idea for a fund raiser." I bet you've heard this line, "We tried that years ago, it didn't work." Why didn't it work? Was it a good idea? Perhaps a new chair or approach would make it work. Put yourself in their position before you veto an idea for advancing the club and its standing in the community.

Did you see the article in the January Lions Clubs International Magazine? Page five presents an interesting story about welcoming new Lions. The article highlights the welcoming of Lion Kerri St. Lawrence into the Swanton- Missisquoi Lions Club. Lion St. Lawrence is a special education teacher who was looking for a place to put her energies to further help her community. Getting in the International Magazine is a real honor for any Lion and their club. Congratulations to you, Lion Kerri, and your club. *Let the Beacon of Hope Shine!*
