

Heartland Lions Club Sponsors Memory Tree in So. Royalton

For the 41st consecutive year, the Heartland Lions Club will sponsor a Memory Tree during the holiday season at the 5 Olde Tavern and Grille on the corner of South Windsor Street and Chelsea Street in South Royalton.

Holiday memorial trees began with the purpose to create a tangible memorial that establishes a physical location where people can rest their sadness, celebrate a warm memory, or just stop and gaze for a few seconds to just remember a loved one.

The Heartland Lions Club Memory Tree project was first established in 1977 by South Royalton resident and Lion, Roger Henry. In 1990, Lion Alfred Jones stepped up to chair the project until his passing in 2015. The Memory Tree project is now chaired by Lions Paulie Hastings and Pam Greene.

Beginning in 1977, a young spruce tree on the south end of the green was the original Memory Tree. Each year, names were written on handmade paper bells and hung on the tree. Eventually the tree grew too big, making it difficult to hang the ornaments where they could be seen. Weather also took its toll on the paper bells.

Heartland Lions Club members continue to hand cut paper bell ornaments, but the Memory Tree has moved to a better-suited site. The club is very grateful for the Memory Tree's current location donated by 5 Olde Tavern and Grille.

Everyone is invited to add the name(s) of a lost loved one to the Memory Tree. Stop by 5 Olde Tavern and Grille and write the name(s) on the Memory Tree list. A Heartland Lions Club member will create a bell inscribed with "in memory of" the loved one and the bell will bhung on the Memory Tree. Name, may also be mailed or given to any member of the Heartland Lions Club.

A list of the memorialized names will also be posted in the lobby of the restaurant. Names of lost pets are also welcome. The Memory Tree will stay up until the beginning of the new year. A small donation is requested, but not required.

The Heartland Lions Club serves the towns of Royalton, Sharon, and Tunbridge. The club raises funds through ventures that include a booth at the Tunbridge Fair, selling food at local events, raffles, the Memory Tree, hosting an annual Valentines Dinner Dance and a Rose Sale each March.

One-hundred percent of the funds raised (after expenses) are put back into the area communities and used to fund the club's service projects to promote vision, hearing and diabetes education, assist area residents in purchasing glasses and hearing aids, support for area fire or disaster victims, support for local food shelves and holiday basket projects, diabetes, hearing and vision youth camp assistance, annual educational scholarships, and to maintain Paine's Beach in South Royalton.

Club meetings are on the first and third Monday of each month at 6:30 p.m. at South Royalton School during winter months, and at Paine's Beach on North Windsor Street during warmer weather.

Granville Lions Club donates building to Granville Food Pantry

Granville, *N.Y.* – The Granville Lions Club Foundation, Inc. has donated funding to the Granville Area Food Pantry and Community Service, Inc. so that it may have its own building in the village of Granville. The club's foundation gave the Food Pantry \$52,000 to purchase a former church building located on Morrison Avenue in Granville. Transfer of the deed to the property from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Albany to the Food Pantry took place on Nov. 29.

"This will better enable us to help serve the food insecure in the Granville area," said Syndy Anoe, director of the Granville Area Food Pantry.

Purchase of the building for the Food Pantry by the Lions Club has been in the works for almost two years. The Lions Club heard that the Food Pantry was losing its space at St. Mary's Church. Shortly afterward, Granville Lion Ron Barrett learned that St. Mary's Church would be selling the former church building next to Veterans Park, and brought that information to the club's board of directors.

The board of directors of the Granville Lions Club began discussions about the feasibility of purchasing the building for the Food Pantry. They decided to pursue it as a Lions "Centennial Project" to celebrate 100 years of Lions International. After many meetings with the Food Pantry and diocesan officials, terms were agreed upon and the process began to complete the sale.

The legal requirements of transferring church property to a non-religious organization were substantial and took many months, including several months awaiting approval from the New York court system. But patience on the part of all parties paid off, and the Granville Area Food Pantry now has a permanent home.

"The Granville Lions Club is extremely happy to finally see this project come to a favorable conclusion," said club President Bob Tardie. "This has been yet another opportunity for our club to contribute to the welfare of our community, which is what Lionism is all about."

The donation was made by the Granville Lions Club Foundation, a not-for-profit formed in April 2016 as the charitable arm of the Granville Lions Club. As a 501(c)3 corporation, the foundation can accept taxdeductible bequeaths and donations. It also distributes all of the club's donations to local and regional beneficiaries. The Granville Lions Club raises funds for its donations through its annual patio furniture sale that takes place every May through August. He gave a detailed account of his experiences there as an eighteen year old fighting, the Battle of Gaemi Hill. This past July, Don and his wife Donna went on a trip as guests of the city of Sejong, South Korea, to participate in a ceremony commemorating the July 1950 battle. In Korea, they received about 67 letters, written by local students, thanking veterans for their fighting in the country. He read an excerpt from one of the letters - "I want to emulate the courage that helped us at that time," reads one letter, written by a student at Sejong Hansol High School. "Always be healthy, and we will never forget that." Don received an "Ambassador of Peace Award" and a Placque of Appreciation from the Republic of Korea.
